Stony Brook University honored the largest graduating class in its history, granting degrees to 7,350 of the world's brightest minds in a May 18 Commencement ceremony at Kenneth P. LaValle Stadium. The Class of 2018 joins the ranks of more than 185,000 Seawolves worldwide, united by a vision of a bold new future.

Stony Brook University [President Samuel L. Stanley Jr.](#) affirmed his confidence in the graduates and the value of their education in his address to the Class of

2018. "But as pleased as we are with that statistic, we will continue to push for excellence, and continue to make your Stony Brook degree and your University something you can always be proud of.
