Mike Damergis is a college media professor at Iona University with over 30 years of experience as a sports producer, reporter and author.

In 2013, Damergis was an executive producer on "Mabel's Dressing Room", a historical short comedy about silent-era actress Mabel Normand and Charlie Chaplin.

During his broadcasting career, he produced and anchored "Baseball This Morning" on Sirius-XM from 2006 through 2010 and was instrumental in launching the first-ever Fantasy Sports Radio channel. Damergis was the radio game-day producer for the New York Giants in 2004 and 2009. He also was a sports talk show producer for WFAN, Fox Sports Radio and The Fan 590 in Toronto. Mike was nominated for "Best Video of the Year" in 2014 by the Fantasy Writers Association and won Advisor of the Year for WICR in 2015 at Iona College.

He is the author of "The USFL -The Rebel League The NFL Didn't Respect But Feared."

In June 2022, his documentary, "Smyrna: Paradise is Burning, the Asa K. Jennings story," won Best Historical Film for the month of May at Cannes World. The film won Honorable Mention in the Fox International Film Festival and was a Semi-Finalist in the Paris International Short Festival. The moving documentary about a Methodist minister, who saved a million lives in Asia Minor 100 years ago, was also an Official Selection in the Athens International Film Festival, the Big Apple Film Festival and the NY International Film Festival.

Pavlos Demertzis-Bouboulis presents the life and actions of his famous ancestor, naval commander Laskarina Bouboulina. Viewers will also have the opportunity of a virtual look inside the heroine's three century old home. Founded in 1991, the mansion is now open to the public as a museum dedicated to the Greek War of Independence and the life of Greek heroine Laskarina Bouboulina, until recently, the first and only woman in world naval history to hold the title of Admiral.

Community Activism and the Ladies Philoptochos Society of New York City, 1930s-1940s

Since the first Greek immigrants arrived in the US in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, Greek women have shaped the philanthropic and educational institutions operating within the sphere of the Greek Orthodox Church. The Church offered the women an acceptable vehicle for contributing their efforts to the Greek immigrant community as well as a forum for cultivating leadership skills. This presentation explores the social and political activism of the Ladies Philoptochos Society in New York City during the 1930s-1940s. The organization's activities went far beyond assistance to the poor as their title suggests: they raised funds for refugees from Asia Minor in the aftermath of the Greco-Turkish War (1919-1922), organized relief efforts for Greece during WWII (1939-1945), and supported a wide array of educational institutions including Greek language schools and St. Basil's Academy. The multi-faceted efforts of the Society uncover a little-known yet rich history of Greek American women's agency, the opportunities they created for themselves, and the challenges they faced.

Fevronia K. Soumakis holds a PhD in History and Education from Teachers College, Columbia University and currently teaches at Queens College, CUNY. She is co-editor with Theodore G. Zervas of *Educating Greek Americans: Historical Perspectives and Contemporary Pathways* (Palgrave Macmillan, 2020). Fevronia's next book project examines the history of Greek American women, education, and philanthropy in the twentieth century.

3RD ANNUAL ESSAY COMPETITION

On Sunday, May 21, 2023, AHEPA Port Jefferson Chapter 319 awarded 3 students at Stony Brook University's Center for Hellenic Studies a total of \$3,000 for their winning essays in a scholarship competition.

Two years ago, Mr. George Kallas, AHEPA 319, and Dr. Stella Tsirka, Stony Brook University, partnered together to create a scholarship competition targeted for students of the Center for Hellenic Studies. The theme of the essay competition was developed by Dr. Tsirka, and each participant interviewed several elderly Greek residents and documented how they were received and blended into the American culture, learned the language, and became established in the community as citizens of the United States. Correlations were encouraged to be drawn to the current immigration environment. Access to elderly Greek and Cypriot residents was facilitated by AHEPA.

Mr. George Kallas then introduced **Dr. Stella Tsirka,** the founder of SBU's Center for Hellenic Studies. Dr. Tsirka thanked AHEPA for supporting the Center for Hellenic Studies with the scholarship program and recognized **Mr. Peter Tsantes** as a donor and sponsor of SBU's Center for Hellenic Studies. She also commented on her experience supporting the AHEPA scholarship competition for the third year in a row, working with Professor Maria Athanasopoulou, the faculty member of the Center for Hellenic Studies who participated in reviewing the competing students' essays, who also shared their experience with the parish.

The three winners of the AHEPA Port Jefferson Chapter 319 scholarship competition for 2023 are: **Georgiana Misthos,**

Eleftherios Apollon Zoumpanidopoulos **Demetrios Kritikos** (not present).

AHEPAN Vice President George Kallas presented each of the 3 competition winners with a check for \$1,000 and a certificate of scholastic achievement.







Each student in turn presented a short speech the parish, to thanking **AHEPA** for the opportunity and the award, and commenting on their main takeaway from the experience interviewing the Greek immigrants and writing the essay with their commentary on the current immigration environment.
