## **Andrew Piper** Rifling Through Books

What kind of knowledge object is a book? In this talk, Piper revisits the book's materiality and the way it shapes how we gain access to knowledge of our world. Whether through a reader's personalized relationship with a book or the book's passage through a broader circuit of communication, books are most often understood as singular, bound objects. Piper is interested in exploring what it would mean instead to understand the book's place within a larger How does an understanding of the material ecology. book broader horizon of things and within а our gestural interactions with those things give us new insights into the history of the book's meaning as an instrument of knowledge?

**Andrew Piper** is Associate Professor in the Department of Languages, Literatures, and Cultures and Associate Member in the Department of Art History and Communication Studies at McGill University. He is a former Andrew W. Mellon New Directions Fellow in the Digital Humanities. He is the author of *Book Was There: Reading in Electronic Times* and *Dreaming in Books: The Making of the Bibliographic Imagination in the Romantic Age*, which was awarded the MLA Prize for a First Book and Honorable Mention for the Harry Levin Prize from the American Comparative Literature Association. Additionally, he is the co-founder of the FQRSC-funded research group Interacting with Print: Cultural Practices of Intermediality, 1700-1900.
